Roanoke is the largest metro in the western half of Virginia with a population of 331,219 spread across 2,322 square miles, yet nothing in the region is far away thanks to an exceptional system of roadways and greenways.

Nestled in the foothills of the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains, the region is your gateway to the finest outdoor recreation available on the East Coast. Simply walk out your backdoor to find adventure where world-class singletrack and road cycling, hiking, paddling, fishing, and more await. From cycling the picturesque Blue Ridge Parkway, to backpacking on the Appalachian Trail, the Roanoke Region's robust natural assets draw outdoor enthusiasts to live, work, and play.

Roanoke has the lowest cost of living for any metro area in Virginia. The Roanoke metro area has the entertainment, housing variety, shopping, and services of a metro area all at a very low cost. Every dollar will go much further in Roanoke whether it be for housing, groceries, utilities, transportation, health care or miscellaneous expenses. Living costs, on average, are 12 percent lower in Roanoke than the nation overall.

Roanoke leaves other metros on the East Coast in the dust when comparing the bottom line. Don't take our word for it; Penny Hoarder listed Roanoke in the 25 Cities that Millenials Can Afford and Actually Want to Live in.

BIKE-FRIENDLY COMMUNITY



Our mountains, trails, and rivers are more than wallpaper; they're part of our DNA. We're the first IMBA Silver-Level Ride Center on the East Coast, and the USA Olympic cycling team, Team Twenty24, recently made the Roanoke Region its home for training.

The region has invested \$45 million in paved and natural-surface trails, resulting in 150 miles of recreation and alternate-transportation options for residents and visitors. And the Roanoke Valley Greenway network is one of our most popular amenities with 25 more miles anticipated to be built in the next 10 years.





FIND YOUR NETWORK

The Roanoke Region is the place to make connections. New to the workforce or new to a workplace, there are active professionals making the region a great place to live, work, and play. Remote workers have access to coworking spaces, networking groups, and alumni associations to help them find their people. 

HEALTHCARE: The Roanoke Region is the medical center of western Virginia and offers state-of-the-art cardiac and cancer diagnosis and care, as well as a Level I Trauma Center and more. The region is served by Carilion Clinic, HCA Lewis Gale, LewisGale Hospital Alleghany, and the Veterans Administration facility. In addition, there is the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine, Radford School of Nursing, and the Fralin Biomedical Research Institute.

LIVE MUSIC: The music scene in the Roanoke Valley in Virginia's Blue Ridge is a mix of sounds and styles that continues to grow. With a great collection of local artists, unique venues full of character, and exciting festivals and events, Virginia's Blue Ridge is earning its spot on the map for live music. TRANSPORTATION: The Roanoke-Blacksburg Regional Airport (ROA) offers nonstop service to eight major cities. Amtrak offers daily service to Amtrak's Northeast Regional Route making it easy to reach Washington DC, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, and Boston; Amtrak's Cardinal Line connects Clifton Forge to Chicago. Valley Metro is the public transportation provider for the valley. And Ride Solutions provides alternative transportation options to citizens including ridesharing, carpooling, and biking programs.
